### Summary

#### 1.1 Introduction

Walter Street Reserve is a much-loved local park in Ascot Vale providing a well-used playing field and high-quality sports facilities in a setting of native trees and shrubs. The upgrade of the Walter Street Reserve Pavilion is an important initiative to ensure the Reserve continues to meet the sporting and broader needs of the local community in a functional, aesthetic, ecological and sustainable manner.

Council has developed a proposed concept plan for the upgrade of Walter Street Pavilion. The design approach for the Pavilion Upgrade Concept Plan considered the existing character of the reserve, minimum standards for national/state sporting bodies, and the needs of current sports club tenants and wider community.

The Plan includes an extension and renovation of the existing sporting pavilion, and provides a framework for the relocation, upgrade and replacement of existing elements of the natural and built environment. Some specific elements included in the design are:

- More changerooms and toilets, to cater for the increasing number of junior and female players.
- More modern, female friendly toilets and separate change rooms.
- Internal toilets for spectators and function attendees.
- A new public toilet will be available to reserve users during daylight hours.
- A more functional internal layout.
- Increased circulation and storage space in the kitchen.
- Increased storage space for general club items.
- Multipurpose spaces for use by the wider community outside of sports club allocated hours.
- Relocation and potential upgrades to the existing playground and Community Garden.

From 18 Nov 2024 – 15 Dec 2024, Council undertook consultation to seek feedback about the Pavilion Upgrade Concept Plan, from community members who use the Pavilion, or who have a general interest in improvements to the Reserve. Feedback received during this consultation will inform the completion of this project.

#### 1.2 Engagement strategies

Community members could contribute to the consultation via:



- A dedicated <u>Your Say page</u> (Appendix 5.1) which linked people to the online survey (Appendix 5.2), the Design Concept Plans and frequently asked questions.
- 2. A QR code included on an onsite poster (Appendix 5.3) which linked people to the online survey (and associated information) via the Your Say page.

A total of 116 people participated in the consultation via completion of the online survey or directly emailed feedback.

#### 1.3 Key Findings

The majority of respondents (75%) either supported (16%) or strongly supported (59%) the Pavilion upgrade. Of those who supported the upgrade, most comments noted the need to upgrade the Pavilion toilets and changerooms, with specific mentions of the need for separate and enhanced facilities for females, juniors and girls. Many comments highlighted the importance of upgrading the toilets and changerooms to cater to the increasing number of users. Proposed upgrades to the Pavilion's parking and lighting, community spaces and catering facilities were also welcomed, as was the incorporation of external art/cultural features.

Some respondents expressed concerns about the removal of established trees, emphasising the ecological impact and the importance of preserving the natural environment. Some local residents also expressed concerns about impact of the upgrade on noise and traffic in the area.

Overall feedback about the proposed relocation and upgrade of the playground highlighted the importance of retaining the playground as a valuable community asset.

Specific feedback included the need to ensure that the new playground is safe for children (including some concern the proposed location is unsafe) and that it retains its current size and functionality. There were also suggestions to incorporate additional features into the playground, such as more seating and shaded areas.

In relation to the community garden, while overall sentiment was supportive, there was strong concern about the need for the garden to be adequately equipped and maintained. There was also some uncertainty about the need for and accessibility of the garden and the suitability of the proposed location.

Overall, the feedback was largely positive, with a strong focus on making the Pavilion more functional, inclusive, and environmentally sustainable



# Methodology

#### 2.1 Key engagement questions

The survey asked respondents:

- Do you currently use the Pavilion? (Yes/No)
- To what extent do you support the proposed concept design for the Pavilion?
   (From strongly oppose to strongly support)
- Would you like to provide any comments to support your rating? (Free text)
- Do you currently experience any barriers accessing the facilities within the Pavilion or Reserve? (Free text)
- Do you have any suggestions about the external appearance of the Pavilion? (Free text)
- There may be opportunities to incorporate additional elements into the design.
   Do you have any suggestions about potential external art/cultural elements, such as a mural? (Free text)
- Are there any specific vegetation or landscaping suggestions you would like to see incorporated into the Reserve? (Free text)
- It is proposed that the current playground will be relocated and replaced as part of this project – what items would you like to see retained? (Free text)
- Do you use the current community garden? (Yes/No)
- A similar sized Community Garden is planned to be relocated on the reserve, do you have any feedback on what this should include? (Free text)

Survey respondents were also asked questions about their demographic characteristics.

#### 2.2 Communication

Council promoted the consultation to local users of the reserve, neighbouring properties, business owners, community groups and the broader community across a range of communication channels, including:

- Your Say webpage
- Posters around the reserve directing community members to Your Say
- Social media posts (Attachment 5.4)
- Letterbox drop and emails to direct feedback to Your Say
- Direct engagement with existing sport club tenants (via meetings, phone calls and emails including a reminder email halfway through the consultation period)

# 2.4 Survey respondent demographics

#### 2.4.1 Connection to Moonee Valley

Survey respondents were asked to identify their connection to Moonee Valley, with the ability to select multiple of the following options:

- I live here
- I work here
- I own property
- I own a business
- I am associated with a business or community group/organisation.

Of the 91 respondents who chose to respond to this question, 83 respondents indicated that they live in Moonee Valley, with 49 indicating they owned property, and 27 indicating they were associated with a business or community group/organisation as depicted in the graph below.

#### 2.4.2 Type of business, community group or organisation association

Respondents (n=27) who were associated with a business or community group /organisation were asked to identify the name of the business or community group /organisation. 7 unique associations were identified and are listed in the table below.

#### 2.4.3 Suburb of residence

Respondents were asked to identify the suburb they live in. Of those who responded to this question (n=90), the majority were from Ascot Vale (n=66). Other suburbs identified can be seen in the graph below. Of those respondents who identified they lived outside of Moonee Valley, the following suburbs were listed: Coburg; Taylor's Lakes; West Footscray; Maidstone.

Figure 2. Suburb of residence






# 2.4.4 Gender identity

Respondents were asked their gender identity. 90 respondents answered this question. A greater percentage of respondents identified as a man (58%) compared with those who identified as a woman (36%). 6% of respondents (n=5) preferred not to say.

Figure 3. Gender identity






# 2.4.5 Age

Respondents were asked to identify which age group they belong to. 90 respondents answered this question, with representation across six age brackets. Most respondents were between 35-49 years old.

#### 2.4.6 Language


Respondents were asked if they usually speak a language other than English at home. 88 respondents answered this question, with the majority (n=82; 93%) indicating they only speak English at home.

Respondents (n=6) who identified that they usually speak a language other than English at home were asked what language they spoke, with responses including Danish (n=1), Hindi (n=1) and Hungarian (n=1).

#### 2.4.7 Additional identifiers

Respondents were asked whether they identify with a range of different options including Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander, LGBTQIA+, person with a disability, a carer, a disability ally, needing assistance with self-care activities/movement and communication.

Figure 5. Additional identifiers






# **Findings**

#### 3.1 Current use of the Pavilion

Participants were asked whether they currently use the Pavilion, with the option of choosing Yes or No. As illustrated in the chart below, 74 respondents said yes (74%) and 26 respondents said No (26%).


Figure 5. Do you currently use the Pavilion?



#### 3.2 Level of support for the Pavilion concept design

Participants were asked to what extent they support the proposed concept design for the Pavilion, with the option to choose 1 of 5 responses, from strongly oppose to strongly support. As illustrated in the graph below, the majority of respondents indicated strongly support (59%), followed by support (16%) and neutral (12%).

# 3.3 Rationale for level of support for the concept design

When asked if they would like to provide any comments regarding their level of support for the proposed concept design for the Pavilion, 72 (65%) participants provided free text comments. Thematic analysis and coding of the comments identified 192 separate mentions. Some comments were assigned more than one code to reflect multiple themes identified within the one comment.

The majority (83%) of comments (n=160) related to rationale for supporting plans to upgrade the Pavilion. The remaining 17% of comments (n=32) expressed opposition or concerns about the proposed upgrade.

#### Rationale for supporting the Pavilion upgrade

As illustrated in the table below, supportive comments were grouped under seven themes. The theme comprising the most (44%) comments (n=70) endorsed the need to upgrade the Pavilion toilets and changerooms. Nearly 30% (n=20) of these comments specifically mentioned the need for separate and enhanced facilities for females, and 17% (n=12) called for these facilities to be more suitable for juniors and girls.

# Rationale for opposing the Pavilion upgrade

Comments expressing opposition or concern about the Pavilion upgrade were grouped under six themes. The most common themes were concerns about tree removal (n=7, 22%) and the playground/child safety (n=7, 22%), followed by concerns about the community garden (n=6, 19%), as summarised below.

# 3.3 Barriers to accessing the Pavilion/Reserve facilities

When participants were asked if they currently experience any barriers to accessing the facilities within the Pavilion or Reserve, 69 (63%) respondents provided free text comments. Analysis of these comments identified four main themes and 96 separate mentions.

While the majority (78%) of comments (n=75) identified specific access barriers, the remaining comments (22%, n=21) related to participants specifying that they don't currently experience any access barriers. Interestingly, of the respondents who specified they don't experience any access barriers, most (67%, n=14) still supported (n=4), or strongly supported (n=10) the proposed upgrade of the Pavilion. This is consistent with responses to the previous question about participant's rationale for supporting the upgrade, which focused on the functionality rather than accessibility of the Pavilion.

As summarised in the table below, the most commonly identified barriers related to concerns about the functionality and safety of various aspects of the Pavilion (n=34), followed by the accessibility of the Pavilion toilets/changerooms (n=29), and the sense that access to the Pavilion is restricted among/to certain community cohorts (n=12).

### 3.4 External appearance of the Pavilion

When participants were asked if they have any suggestions about the external appearance of the Pavilion, 59 respondents provided free text comments. Analysis of these comments identified 6 themes and 61 separate mentions.

Nearly half (49%) of the comments (n=30) offered specific suggestions about the external appearance of the Pavilion. The remaining 51% (n=31) of the comments either specified the participants had no suggestions (n=17) or related to 'other feedback' (n=14) (already mentioned, or unrelated to the external appearance of the Pavilion).

As summarised in the table below, the most common theme among the specific suggestions related to feedback about the Pavilion being environmentally friendly and sustainable (n=16), with small numbers of suggestions about vegetation (n=5), use of modern, high-quality materials (n=5) and incorporation of external murals, art and signage (n=4).

# 3.5 External art/cultural design elements

When participants were asked if they have any suggestions about potential external art/cultural design elements, such as a mural, 52 respondents provided free text comments. Analysis of these comments identified 6 themes and 59 separate mentions.

Around 46% of the comments (n=27) either offered specific suggestions about or were generally supportive of incorporating external art/cultural design elements. Of the remaining comments, a similar proportion (44%, n=26) related to 'other feedback' (already provided or unrelated to external art/cultural design elements) (n=15), or specified they had no suggestions (n=11). The remaining 10% (n=6) expressed concern or opposition in relation to a mural.

As summarised in the table below, the most common theme among the specific suggestions related to feedback about the importance of an external mural or public art having a meaningful connection to the local community (n=12), followed by specific preferences for the use of a local or Indigenous artist or design (n=8), and those who were generally supportive of incorporating an external mural or public art into the Pavilion (n=7).

# 3.6 Vegetation and landscaping within the Reserve

When participants were asked if there are any specific vegetation or landscaping suggestions they would like to see incorporated into the Reserve, 55 respondents provided free text comments. Analysis of these comments identified 7 themes and 63 separate mentions.

Most (63%) of the comments (n=40) offered specific suggestions about vegetation or landscaping. Of the remaining comments, 19% (n=12) specified they had no



suggestions and 17% (n=11) related to 'other feedback' (already provided or unrelated to vegetation or landscaping).

As summarised in the table below, the most common theme among the specific suggestions related to the use of vegetation that is native and in keeping with the local environment (n=13), followed by maximising vegetation and tree cover (n=10) and concerns about tree removal (n=7).

# 3.7 Retention of playground elements

When participants were asked what items they would like to see retained within the relocated and replaced playground, 60 respondents provided free text comments. Analysis of these comments identified 9 themes and 79 separate mentions.

The majority (78%) of the comments (n=62) offered specific suggestions about or were generally supportive of the playground being retained and upgraded. Of the remaining comments, 16% (n=13) expressed negative sentiment about the proposal for the playground, and 7% (n=4) specified and they had no suggestions.

As summarised in the table below, the most common theme was suggestions about specific playground equipment to retain (n=20 mentions), followed by general support for the retention and upgrade of the playground (n=13 mentions) and replicating the existing playground (n=11 mentions). Among the negative sentiment, the most common theme was opposition to the proposed location for the playground (n=10).



# 3.8 Current use of the Community Garden

Participants were asked whether they use the current Community Garden, with the option of choosing Yes or No.

As illustrated in the chart below, 82 respondents said no (89%) and 10 respondents said yes (11%).

# 3.9 Community Garden design

When participants were asked if they have any feedback about what the relocated Community Garden should include, 59 respondents provided free text comments. Analysis of these comments identified 8 themes and 74 separate mentions.



Around 45% of the comments (n=33) were generally supportive of or offered specific suggestions about retaining and relocating the community garden. Of the remaining comments, 30% (n=22) expressed negative sentiment about the garden, and 24% (n=18) specified and they had no suggestions.

As summarised in the table below, the most common theme was generally supportive comments (n=11) followed by suggestions about specific infrastructure the community garden should include (n=10). The predominant negative sentiment questioned the overall need for (n=15) and proposed location (n=8) of the garden.

# **Emails**

Five emails were received during the consultation period, reflecting five key themes which have been summarised below (in order of mentions):



**Tree Removal and Vegetation**: Concerns about the removal of canopy trees and vegetation. The feedback emphasises the importance of preserving large trees and the negative impact of removing them on the environment and community. There was one suggestion for altering the entrance for Walter Street Reserve so that no trees would be removed.

Climate Change and Environmental Impact: The community expresses concerns about climate change and the need for more green spaces to combat the heat island effect. There are mentions of the climate emergency and the importance of increasing tree cover. It was also suggested that the airconditioned pavilion could be used as a climate refuge for locals without air conditioning during hot period.

**Playground and Recreational Facilities**: Feedback includes suggestions for improving playground facilities, such as adding sun protection and keeping it close by the club house for supervision purposes, a basketball half-court and rock/wall climbing facilities. There was also a request for Council to address noise issues and safety issues from the cricket nets.

**Community Amenities and Infrastructure**: There are concerns about the enlargement of the pavilion and its impact on the community, including increased congestion, noise, and loss of amenity.

**Wildlife and Natural Spaces**: The feedback highlights the importance of preserving natural spaces for wildlife and the community, mentioning the return of Tawny Frogmouths and the need for more trees and shrubs.

#### Letters

One letter was received during the consultation period which reflected the following themes:

**Community Amenities and Infrastructure**: There are concerns about the enlargement of the pavilion and its impact on the community, including increased congestion, noise from out of hours club gatherings, and loss of amenity and privacy for local residents due to the relocation of the toilets.

**Community Garden usefulness**: There was a comment noting that usage of the community garden is low and questioned its viability into the future. It was further suggested that the use of compost bins in an area close to residential houses would increase the risk of vermin.



#### Conclusion

The majority of respondents supported the upgrade, particularly emphasising the need for modern and separate facilities for female and junior players. Many comments highlighted the importance of upgrading the toilets and changerooms to cater to the increasing number of users. Proposed upgrades to the Pavilion's parking and lighting, community spaces and catering facilities were also welcomed, as was the incorporation of external art/cultural features.

Some respondents expressed concerns about the removal of established trees, emphasising the ecological impact and the importance of preserving the natural environment. Some local residents also expressed concerns about impact of the upgrade on noise and traffic in the area.

Overall feedback about the proposed relocation and upgrade of the playground highlighted the importance of retaining the playground as a valuable community asset.

Specific feedback included the need to ensure that the new playground is safe for children (including some concern the proposed location is unsafe) and that it retains its current size and functionality. There were also suggestions to incorporate additional features into the playground, such as more seating and shaded areas.

In relation to the community garden, while overall sentiment was supportive, there was strong concern about the need for the garden to be adequately equipped and maintained. There was also some uncertainty about the need for and accessibility of the garden and the suitability of the proposed location.

Overall, the feedback was largely positive, with a strong focus on making the Pavilion more functional, inclusive, and environmentally sustainable


